One of TV's unlikely hits in recent years is The Repair Shop on BBC 1. The concept behind the show, which now attracts audiences of 6.7 million, is, on the face of it, a recipe for very dull TV: people bring their dilapidated old possessions and heirlooms to a barn, where a group of experts restore them. Then the owners come and get them.

But there is, of course, much more to it than that.

The reason behind the show's success is that almost every item brought into the repair shop has its own very special, and often very moving, story to tell.

I remember one episode that I missed the start of, but joined towards the end. The team were putting the finishing touches to the restoration of a clock set into the side of a beautiful wooden ship with metal sails.

The clock had been given as a gift by a grandfather to his grandson when he was boy. Now, grown up and with a son of his own, the grandson returned to the barn for the big reveal.

The clock's owner was deaf and communicated through sign language. His son interpreted as his father expressed his emotion at being reunited with the clock, now restored to its former glory. He said that he could suddenly see his grandfather more clearly in his mind, and that seeing the clock as it was when he had received it so many years ago made him feel like he had been reunited with his grandfather who died when he was just 10 years old.

As I watch the Repair Shop I often reflect that what the world really needs is an equivalent barn where broken people can turn up and share openly and honestly the stories behind how they came to be broken and to acknowledge our own part in that story; a place where, having shared the story, we can then ask to be carefully, lovingly, painstakingly restored to our former glory.

Imagine if we had the opportunity to be repaired, restored, re-created by our master craftsman creator, lovingly held in his hands as he removes all the dirt and stains, cracks and damage of our lives, restoring us to his original vision for us.

Well, the good news is that such a barn does exist.

Possibly the best known and loved Psalm is Psalm 23. It begins The Lord is my Shepherd. Written by a young shepherd boy thousands of years ago and often sung at weddings, baptisms and funerals it offers comfort, hope, and assurance of a better future. It offers a promise of restoration by God our Creator.

If we are moved by the restoration of a clock, imagine the emotion and power of seeing human beings restored. Now that's a show I love to watch!





AN ENGINEER IN OUR COMMUNITY

Space will not allow me to tell the story of PJ Parmiters, agricultural engineers who occupied the Station Works site, now the subject of a controversial planning exercise, for about 100 years. However, I would like to tell you the story of David Boxall who worked there for 30 of those years.

David was brought up in West Sussex. The schoolroom at West Wittering, where David's father had been taught to write on slates, was one of the first buildings to be relocated at the Weald and Downland living museum at Singleton. A barn at the museum is now the location for the popular BBC TV series "The Repair Shop". Singleton is a short distance to the north of the Goodwood Estate where young David was an assistant shepherd. He was encouraged to attend evening classes at a local college. These included agricultural engineering. The farm manager realized that he had a natural ability in this field. He arranged for David to study engineering at the West of Scotland agricultural college. He also had contacts with Parmiters, no doubt through their being the largest manufacturers of chain harrows in the country. David attended an interview here and was accepted.

He started in the development department in 1974. They designed and experimented with new agricultural machines. One was a highly successful silage block cutter. David accompanied a prototype to The Royal Show where it won a silver medal. They tried out some of their experimental machines on Wallmead Farm.

David lodged in The Causeway, driving home at weekends to his family in his trusty Renault 4. In 1978 Janet Pitcher who lived at Ridge (her father was the building foreman on the Fonthill Estate) came to work in Parmiters payroll office. They were married in 1982.

David Young was the boss when David started and was followed by his son John. The firm became part of the Wolseley empire. The last managing director was Simon Wilcox who had started working in sales in 1981

Parmiters sadly closed in 2005. It had been the largest employer in our village. The buildings had expanded to 120,00 sq feet and at its peak accommodated about 150 employees. There were many redundancies, but all staff found new employment. Several generations of local families had found work there.

By this time David had become the Service Engineer, responding to difficulties that customers were experiencing in working with the many types of implement which were being sold at home and abroad. David needed to understand them all and be prepared to rectify problems on the farms. His work took him all over Britain and Ireland, the continent and even to Nigeria.

Several of the machine tools were sold when work finished. A factory in North India acquired the machinery which made chain harrows from steel coil using a cold process. David and his team dismantled and boxed the machines. He and Simon Wilcox then flew out to Delhi for 3 weeks to supervise their installation. The vast factory made among other things thousands of Flip-flop style shoes. Simon and David stayed in the splendid Crown Plaza hotel in New Delhi. There were special visits to amazing Hindu temples and the Taj Mahal.

Martin Shallcross

I can't resist a few stories about Parmiters in earlier days. Philip Parmiter started as a blacksmith making the first flexible harrows in a shed at Horwood farm on the A30 in Ansty. He employed 4 men: Messrs. Macey, Parsons, Grey and Edwards. In 1890 they moved to a small hut close to the old Tisbury gasworks opposite the station buildings. In 1896 they were exhibiting their harrows in the Royal Agricultural Show. In 1898 Philip commission a Leeds firm building steam traction engines to build him one of the first load-carrying road vehicles. Many years later elevators were built to lift hay and straw and a successful post driver was manufactured, followed in 1986 by the Shear Grab silage cutter. The gas works went in 1921 and eventually Parmiters occupied 3 acres of land.

PS For the uninitiated chain harrows are made by bending steel rods so that sharpened points scratch, either through pasture to aerate it in the spring, or across arable land to help prepare a seedbed and roll up weeds for destruction. They were dragged originally by carthorses and later by tractors.

The core of their farming business, run by his son Peter, is a 200 cow dairy farm but the acreage increased a few years ago to about 1000 acres, all in the Nadder Valley. Martin is a well-known writer for Focus, having written for over 20 years on topics based around farming. 80 of these were printed in a book a few years ago, although it's now sadly out of print. The meeting will take place at 7.30 p.m. in the Hinton Hall, next to St. John's Church, Tisbury.

For your diaries, our October meeting is on 12th October, on the "Follies of Wiltshire", presented by Jonathan Holt. Jonathan is a tour guide, author of books on Dorset, Somerset, Gloucestershire and Bristol, and most recently, "Wiltshire Follies" (Amberley Publishing). 

TISBURY AND DISTRICT NATURAL **HISTORY SOCIETY**

For the about the last ten years whenever we cut grass for silage or hay, within minutes we are joined by red kites looking for a quick meal. Their eyesight is truly incredible. Andrew Graham opens up a window to these beautiful birds.

"The red kite is a magnificent bird of prey becoming increasingly common in this part of Wiltshire. It is unmistakeable, with its rufous brown body and distinctive forked tail which it twists to use as a rudder in flight. In the 1930's the UK population declined to two pairs which clung on in mid Wales, but the species was saved from national extinction by a major protection programme. Since then, birds from Spain and Sweden have been successfully re-introduced to England and Scotland. Red Kites now breed over an expanding area of the UK and non-breeding and wintering birds may be seen across most of the country.

The birds we will see are almost certainly part of the expanding reintroduced population rather than from the surviving native population in Wales. Males and females are essentially similar but in bright sunshine their strongly marked plumage is striking. The white primary feathers of the wing contrast with black wingtips, the yellow beak and eye stand out against the grey head while, in the right light, the tail may look positively orange. Its call is like but distinct from that of the buzzard less mewling and more quavering - and will often be heard when several birds are together. Indeed, as numbers of birds in an area starts to grow, they may gather in communal woodland roosts where they can be seen dropping in from the surrounding countryside at dusk.

They were common birds of the town in Shakespearean times where they lived on carrion and offal and served an important role in clearing up human waste. When birdwatching in Europe, rubbish dumps were often a good place to find them. Their diet remains mostly carrion, roadkill and worms which they can often be seen collecting in recently ploughed fields. As scavengers, they are particularly prone to poisoning from illegal poisoned baits and pesticides. They will occasionally take small mammals given the chance and will gather around harvesting operations on the lookout for a meal.

Red kites' nest in woodland in a scruffy nest often on top of an old crow's nest. They hunt widely over mixed countryside, wooded valleys, and pasture,

will stray over towns and can be see flying over Tisbury on occasion. Urban areas near the successful reintroduction in the Chilterns now regularly see numerous (double figures) kites overhead. This is partly because people took



to putting out scraps to attract this impressive bird to close guarters. Unfortunately, this has resulted in a developing problem akin to that of herring gulls at seaside resorts where emboldened birds, used to being fed, start to pinch food from humans. This can be very alarming for children, so such feeding is not recommended. Nothing like that has been reported hereabouts so hopefully we can enjoy more views of this handsome bird in years to come without encouraging them to become a pest. Then our summer lunches won't be subject to the warning: "red kite in the morning; put out the awning"."

On **Tuesday 7th September** there is an evening visit to Martin Green's farm at Sixpenny Handley. Farm conservation and archaeology will make for a very interesting visit. On Thursday 16th September there is the first of our indoor meetings with Simon Smart talking from 7.30pm about wildlife conservation on the MOD land in the Salisbury Plain. PLANT SNIPPETS

As you might have heard, Chelsea Flower show this year is in September, rather than the usual date of late May. This is exciting, as it has never been held at this time of year before and probably never will be again; (Covid allowing) it will go back to May again next year. I am lucky enough to be part of the team mentoring the horticultural students at Sparsholt college, who are putting together the College Show Garden in the Floral Marquee. The theme this year will be celebrating the Tricentenary of Gilbert White, the renowned naturalist and author who published the world's first natural history book: **The Natural History of Selbourne.**

White, born in 1720, grew up and spent most of his life in the Hampshire village of Selbourne and from a young age was a keen gardener. He took a wide interest in the natural world around him and was keen to experiment with growing traditional and novel fruit and vegetables; he was the first person in the area to grow potatoes! This fascination with horticulture led to Gilbert writing his first book the **Garden Kalendar** which meticulously recorded sowings, harvesting, weather, temperature, and other details. He went on to keep over 30 years of diaries, observing all that went on in the surrounding countryside -the comings and goings of migratory birds, the behaviour of animals and insects and the progress (or not) of the plants in his garden. These journals culminated in his writing of **'The Natural History of Selbourne'** which was published in the form of letters to two eminent naturalists at the time, Thomas Pennant and the Honourable Daines Barrington.

The students have been following plantings familiar to White to recreate a fabulous version of his garden, including the wildflower meadow, hot bed melon frame and beds packed with flowers, herbs and vegetables. Despite it being put together for the autumn they have kept true to the plan and shown real horticultural skills to keep the plants looking their best for the show.

It is rather apt, when dealing with the extremes of weather over the past few months, the invasion of tortrix moths on Kale and other general day- to- day dramas in running the nursery, that we look to Gilbert White's own entries into the 'Kalendar':

1769 September 4th: Hop picking begins.

1772 September 7th: Peaches Begin to ripen.

1773 September 10th: Rain damages the walled fruit

1779 September 9th: My kidney beans are much withered for want of rain.

1784 September 21st: Gathered in the early pippins, called white apples: a great crop

1785 September 15th: the dripping weather has lasted this day nine weeks, all thro haying and harvest; much hay also soiled of the second cutting: so that men, having lost both crops, will in many parts be very short of fodder, especially, as turnips have missed in many parts.

1790 September 16th: Cut 100 cucumber, Sweet Autumnal weather.

Let's hope for some sweet Autumnal weather this year and many bountiful crops!

NADDER COMMUNITY ENERGY

Help shape Wiltshire's climate strategy

We've all seen the havoc that extreme weather driven by global warming is causing around the world. And we're only too well aware of the dire warnings of global catastrophe if governments fail to commit to deep cuts in carbon emissions over the next few decades.



But what are we doing about this closer to home? How can we play our part in helping to save the planet?

Compared to many other parts of the country, people in and around the Nadder Valley are fairly green-minded and sustainability-aware – perhaps because we're lucky enough to live so close to such beautiful nature.

We know the actions each of us can take as individuals if we're so minded and have the resources to make the changes. Better insulation for our homes, solar panels on our roofs, replacing old boilers with heat pumps, cutting back on air travel, switching to electric cars, eating less meat, choosing local produce, planting trees, even down to replacing old light bulbs with low-energy versions.

But, just as important, we can use our voice, individually and collectively, to influence local and national policymakers whose big decisions can have such an impact on all our lives. And in the case of climate change, not just our lives, but the lives of our children, grandchildren and future generations.

Hence the crucial importance of having your say about Wiltshire Council's upcoming Climate Strategy.

The Council earned plaudits for being one of the first to declare a climate emergency and to set itself a target of net zero carbon by 2030. In May it published a thorough background analysis of the current state of play in a discussion document which you can read on the WC website, under 'climate'.

However, the absolutely key document will be the Council's Climate Strategy Consultation due out on 1st September. This is the one each of us can influence by having our say and helping to shape Wiltshire's climate-related policies over the next four years.

Alert! We'll only have a few weeks to respond – the consultation closes on 17th October – so we'll need to get our skates on. Let's make sure that every one of our community groups, parish councils, chambers of commerce, schools and colleges, and other special interests, knows about the consultation, picks up on it, makes time to consider it, gets their response in in time, and holds Wiltshire Council to task in committing to meaningful actions, with urgent time frames and proper funding to back things up.

Ambitious enough. Soon enough. Funding enough.

And just space to let you know that Nadder Community Energy will be participating in Salisbury Transition City's People in the Park festival on Saturday 18th September from 11am to late afternoon. Lots of stalls, music and assorted happenings in Queen Elizabeth Gardens, Salisbury. Hope to see you there!

SALISBURY EDUCATION & BUSINESS PARTNERSHIP NEEDS YOUR HELP!

The Partnership has been setup between all local secondary schools and local business organisations including Salisbury Chamber, Salisbury BID and Sarum Rotary. Its key aims are to create closer links between secondary schools and businesses and to develop and retain more students locally.

'Investing in our talent', the Partnership's first initiative, needs your support. Local business owner and representative of the Partnership, David Clayton, said 'By supporting and interacting with schools at an early stage, we know from personal experience that this will help to develop and grow their ambitions and hopefully retain their talent locally, rather than lose them elsewhere.'

STONEHENGE A303 TUNNEL UPDATE

Opponents of the scheme were relieved and delighted when the judge in the case brought against the scheme by Save Stonehenge WHS ruled that the permission granted by the Secretary of State for Transport was invalid. This was because:

- The Secretary of State had not properly considered the degree of harm to the Stonehenge landscape, and it was not legally sufficient for him to say that in his opinion the benefit outweighed the harm.
- The Secretary of State had not considered other options for improving traffic flow.

As well as the harm to our wonderful prehistoric landscape, this scheme is extremely unpopular, with over 200,000 signatures to the petition against it, 2/3 from the UK, and £80,000 raised to fight the legal battle in a few weeks.

The economic case rests entirely on a survey of fewer than 4,000 people in 2016. They were asked how much increased income tax they would be willing to pay to have the road removed - but they were not shown images of the cuttings, only of the stones with and without the road. Believe it or not, the entire case for spending £2bn on this scheme rests on multiplying this figure by the country's driving population and claiming that is what the tunnel would be worth to the nation! (with a lot of statistical manipulation, of course). An entertaining webinar is here:

Since 2016 a few things have happened: the reality of climate change is starkly evident, and there are probably more important ways to spend £2bn than on a road which is blocked for only a small proportion of time. How about a 30mph speed limit that would double the capacity of the road, and investigate clever lane design.

Of course it is to be expected that the Government and Highways England will fight back against this judgement. It is like some horror movie where just as we think it is safe to relax, a horrible arm appears from under the ground yet again!

What to do: write to Dr Murrison, our MP and for Stonehenge; write to the Prime Minister; write to Baroness Charlotte Vere, Minister for Roads.

NEW CLIMATE CHANGE FUNDING PROGRAMME

A new upcoming UK wide small grants programme will support communities across the UK to take action on climate change. The UK Government's Together for Our Planet initiative has been created to engage people with the 26th UN Climate Change Conference of The National Lottery Community Fund the Parties (COP26) in Glasgow and is supported by National Lottery funding.





YOUNG NATURALIST: WILTSHIRE BUTTERFLIES

Wiltshire is a county with various different habitats, from grassland to woodland which are perfect for lots of different butterflies. One of my favorites is the beautiful Painted Lady, which I often spot on the flowers in my garden. The Painted Lady is a long-distance migrant: each year it spreads northwards from North Africa, the Middle East, and central Asia, recolonising in mainland Europe and reaching Britain and Ireland.

I have also spotted many Skippers in the grassland clearings around the farm, my favourite being the Large Skipper. They favour grassy areas, where plants grow in damp, sheltered places where the grass is tall and uncut. It is also a species of urban habitats and can often be found in parks and other places with long grasses.

In the woodlands, I often see Speckled Woods basking in the sun. With dark brown wings and speckled cream dots, Speckled Woods are the only British Butterfly that are able to hibernate through the winter as either a caterpillar or chrysalis.

The UK has 59 species of butterfly, 57 resident species and 2 regular migrants. Five species of butterfly have become extinct in the last 150 years and the State of the UK's Butterflies 2015 report found that 76% of the UK's resident and regular migrant butterflies declined in abundance, occurrence or both over the last four decades.

However, we can make small changes to prevent losing anymore species.

Donating – by donating money to the Butterfly Conservation Trust, you can help buy essential items like seeds and plug plants that are needed throughout the year, help develop ways to engage families and young people and help continue to support farmer and landowners to manage their land for butterflies.

Gardening – by simply growing a few plants and providing butterflies with a garden refuge, you can make a huge difference. Butterflies will visit any garden, however big or small, if they can feed from nectar plants. Butterflies are valuable pollinators that need our help, so it is vital that we make homes for them, providing plants and flowers where they can drink nectar and also find spaces to lay their eggs.

Volunteering - Butterfly Conservation relies on the support of thousands of volunteers, and they are always looking for more help inside the office and in the field. Whether you want to volunteer at a local branch, record, monitor or fundraise, get outside and help manage nature reserves or help with one of the events, there is something for everyone, so get involved! Your time can make a real difference.

FLAVOURS OF FOCUS FROM FORTY YEARS AGO

Welcome to this recollection from the September 1981 edition of Focus on the Community.

Early on we had a report from Judith Kirby entitled, "We Were There". "Where was 'There'?" you may ask. It seems that Judith, together with her husband Idris and daughter Sarah, chose to set off by train from Tisbury one Tuesday evening late in July 1981. Their intent was to witness the procession to and from St Paul's Cathedral of the wedding of Prince Charles and Lady Diana Spencer.

Arriving at Waterloo, they walked along the Strand and then the Mall, across Green Park and onto Hyde Park where they saw the firework display. Later they returned to the pavements of Fleet Street to settle down circa 1.15 in the morning and begin the long wait until the ceremony at 11.20. The traffic flowed continuously until the streets were cleared some three hours later. Sleep was impossible, mostly because of the circumstances but also because of a very loud relay system presenting the voice of Tony Blackburn.


Soon after 8.00 the guests began to arrive as did Beefeaters, policemen, celebrities, foreign royalty and, to much amusement, some grit lorries. At 10.20 the Royal Procession appeared. Happily, the relay system then switched to a broadcast of the service itself. The service ended with the National Anthem at which

point everyone stood and, as the procession progressed on its return to Buckingham Palace, much cheering and flag waving was to be observed. Judith concluded, "What a tremendous thrill to be part of that glorious happy day."

Meanwhile back in Tisbury, the community was preparing for the September Carnival including a dog show, a band concert, skittles, an Old Tyme Music Hall, the Village Race, folk dancing, escapology, fire eating, a Romany dance, the Coles' Fun Fair, and of course the Children's and Evening processions.

With autumn approaching, several afternoon and evening classes were on offer; these included typing, spinning, weaving and dyeing, dressmaking, lacemaking, upholstery and, if all that wasn't 'fitting', there was 'Keep Fit' as well.

News from local organisations included the two Tisbury Brownie packs, the Tisbury Cubs, the Tisbury Youth Club, Tisbury Local History Society; Tisbury Wives Group; Tisbury Women's Institute; Newtown, Hatch and Tuckingmill Women's Institute; and Tisbury Bowling Club - and Tisbury Arts Group who were seeking recruits for roles on and behind the stage for the Christmas Pantomime, "Dick Whittington".



Speaking of cubs, reporters from Tisbury Primary School, in an article entitled, "Landlubbers Ahoy", recorded their reactions to visiting HMS Dolphin, the submarine base at Gosport and, in particular, the submarine HMS Finwhale lying shark-like at its moorings. Descending the conning tower was like 'entering its stomach'. Inside it was hot, cramped, narrow, greasy, and stuffy with the smell of diesel fumes. Endless metal steps, closely stacked bunk beds, and arrays of dials, switches, buttons, gears and other controls occupied the narrow passages. The fresh air on disembarking was most welcome.

After last month's excursion into Grottoes, Mollie Thorne, in her series, "For the Gardeners", returned to more conventional gardening matters and especially the graciousness, abundance, modesty and gentleness of white roses.

TISBURY SURGERY

We will all miss Laurence and Jane immensely when they retire. Their contribution to the surgery over the past 28 years has been extraordinary and we wish them a very happy retirement.

As this article is written we are interviewing for new reception and administrative staff as our practice list and workload levels continue to increase, so we will update on non-clinical staff members next month. However, in the meantime, we thought it would be useful to give some detail of our clinical staff – both current and those whom we will welcome shortly.

After Dr. Carter's retirement Dr. Adam Smith will lead the G.P. team and be joined in October by Dr. Tom Marshall. Many of you will already know Dr. Maggie Carson and we were delighted that Dr. Hannah Bintcliffe joined us in June. Although sad to say goodbye to Dr. Sophie Win, who successfully completed her G.P. training in August, we now welcome our new G.P. registrar - Dr. Laura Strachan – who will be with us for the next year.

The nurse team is led by Sister Victoria Smith. Mrs. Tracy Slater works alongside her (and is our diabetes specialist) and their team is completed by Mrs. Sarah Clarke and Mrs. Sharon McGookin – who is also our carers' lead.

Along with staff changes, our minds once again turn to flu vaccination time!

We will be holding two main flu clinics at Tisbury Surgery on **Saturday 25th September** and **Saturday 2nd October**. We will have a new system for booking flu vaccinations this year. Patients will be able to follow a link sent to their phone by text message which will enable them to book their own flu clinic appointment.

IT IS ABSOLUTELY VITAL we have patients' correct mobile phone numbers. We have learnt when trying to contact patients for covid vaccinations that many have not been updated and this will be the first method by which we try to contact you. The new system will allow patients to choose their own convenient appointment and should ensure that the surgery telephone is not constantly engaged by patients trying to book flu clinic appointments. This should also reduce the wait for those who do not have a mobile phone and therefore need to telephone the surgery.

The eligibility for flu vaccination clinics this year as defined by NHS England are:

people aged 50 years or over (including those becoming age 50 years by 31 March 2022); those aged from 6 months to less than 50 years of age in a clinical risk group such as those with chronic (long-term) respiratory disease, such as asthma (requires continuous or repeated use of inhaled or systemic steroids or with previous exacerbations requiring hospital admission), chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) or bronchitis, chronic heart disease, such as heart failure, chronic kidney disease at stage 3, 4 or 5, chronic liver disease, chronic neurological disease, such as Parkinson's disease or motor neurone disease, learning disability, diabetes, splenic dysfunction or asplenia, a weakened immune system due to disease (such as HIV/AIDS) or treatment (such as cancer treatment), morbidly obese (defined as BMI of 40 and above) and all pregnant women (including those women who become pregnant during the influenza season) plus household contacts of immunocompromised individuals, specifically individuals who expect to share living accommodation on most days over the winter and, therefore, for whom continuing close contact is unavoidable, those who are in receipt of a carer's allowance, or who are the main carer of an older or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if the carer falls ill – plus health and social care staff.

Parents of 2–3-year-olds and younger children at risk will be contacted when we have received notice of the availability of appropriate vaccinations. Older children up to age 16 will be vaccinated at school.

Currently the Government has still to clarify any plans for covid vaccination boosters this autumn, but as/ when/if these happen, the plan is that patients will once again be invited to the Michael Herbert Hall in Wilton – again initially by text message.

HINDON SURGERY - WINTER VACCINATIONS AND NEW SURGERY

The 'flu infections are predicted to come sooner and be more common this winter. 'Flu is highly infectious and caught in the same way as Covid-19. Last year there were almost no cases as we all took personal infection control really seriously and had the highest uptake of 'flu vaccination ever. We saw far fewer cases of other respiratory infections and our patients with chronic respiratory illnesses (asthma and COPD) had very few exacerbations.

Now we are mixing more there are more respiratory infections including Covid-19 and it is even more important this year to have a high uptake of 'flu vaccinations. We have enough vaccine arriving in early September for all adult at risk patients.

The bulk of the vaccinations will be at the drive-through and walk-through clinics:

The **drive-through clinics** will be on Saturday and Sunday 18/19 and 25/26 September between 0900 and 1700 at Berwick Farms on the Fonthill Estate, SP3 5SN (as last year).

The walk-through clinic will be at Hindon Church on Monday to Thursday 20 - 23 September between 0900 and 1200. This is ideal for anyone who can walk from their home to the church.

Please ring reception to book your appointment (if impossible at the large clinics we will fit you in at the surgery when you are able to come and will do at home for the totally housebound). These clinics will mean the surgery can work completely normally during the vaccination campaign and your infection risk is minimised.

We will contact parents of the children aged two and three and older children at increased risk about their 'flu vaccination (nasal drops) as soon as we can order the vaccine through central NHS supplies (sometime in September). Most children will be vaccinated at school by their vaccination provider.

We have not had any recent information about the Covid-19 boosters but they will not be done at the same time as the 'flu vaccinations or in general practice (apart from care homes and the housebound). The GP-led vaccination clinic in Wilton will re-open and we will contact all eligible patients when able to book appointments.

'Flu vaccination is free and recommended for everyone who will be 50 and over on 31 March 2022 plus younger people who are informal carers, front-line health and social care staff, live in the same household as a shielded person, or have a medical condition that increases the risk of severe 'flu – pregnancy, obesity, diabetes, asthma, COPD, immunosuppressed (by illness or medication) and chronic heart, liver, kidney or neurological disease).

If you have not already booked your 'flu vaccination with us or are unsure if you are eligible please ring reception (01747 820222).

Plans for the Hindon Development Plan including the new surgery are available to view at www.cgfryhindon. co.uk, where you can also provide feedback. We encourage all our patients to do so and if you want to be more involved, please apply to join the surgery Patient Representative Group. This will be your surgery for decades to come and your idea may get put into the detailed planning. In the past 20 years we have found all the best ideas that have improved your care have come from our patients or staff.

A RECIPE WITH...GARLIC AND HONEY

Another fermentation recipe this month. This heavenly concoction packs a serious punch as far as antiviral properties go. The honey must be raw otherwise no fermenting will take place.

Honey-fermented garlic

2-3 bulbs garlic, the bigger the cloves the better
1/2 -3/4 jar raw local honey
Chilli flakes/ thyme/ grated ginger
A little olive oil



Peel garlic and partially slice each clove so that the honey

penetrates. 2/3 fill a sterilised jar, adding chilli, thyme or grated ginger if you wish. Pour honey over the top, making sure that each garlic clove is covered, add extra honey to make sure it's all covered but leave a gap of 2.5 cm before running a smear of olive oil around the rim of the jar, to stop the lid from sticking. Leave in a dark place for two days and open lid carefully to release the gas. Do this every 3-4 days, oiling the rim each time you open the jar, for about three weeks so that the flavours develop, by which time the garlic will have sunk to the bottom. It will bubble away quickly if the weather is warm so keep an eye on it.

Eat it however you like: on toast, with grilled meat, with mature hard cheese or add to a salad dressing!



- Bicycle racks are now available adjacent to the public toilets.



STATION WORKS DEVELOPMENT - AUGUST NEWS

By the time you read this the situation may have changed – please check social media if you can to get updates. The Parish Council has its own facebook page – Tisbury Village News.

As previously reported, a company called Tisbury Community Homes owns the station works site and through their agents, Intelligent Land, have published a draft "Design and Access Statement", which we take to be a draft 'Masterplan'. They had informed us that they were intending to apply for outline planning consent – but we have heard nothing from them for several weeks. They also promised to share the findings from their public consultation but haven't done so yet.

Tisbury Parish Council, in partnership with West Tisbury Parish Council, held its own public consultation and has had a huge response from the community. We have received over 300 emails and comments, the majority of them opposing the proposed plans.

It must be pointed out that most people agree the site should be developed, but there is alarm at the scale of the development and the problems with access – specifically the proposal to pedestrianise one arch of the railway bridge and install traffic lights.

We are aware that there is a strong feeling of concern and frustration that nothing is apparently being done. In fact, the Parish Councillors have been devoting a huge amount of their time in trying to find a solution that is satisfactory for the village. But we also have a duty to remain neutral and in no way prejudge the developers' proposal. We should also say that the legal situation is hugely complex and we have to be very careful.

As a measure of the complexity let me give you this example: Wiltshire Council do not currently have a five-year land supply for future building. This means that our Neighbourhood Plan, which we laboured over for five years, may be redundant in November because it is more than two years old. This situation is happening across the country and developers are using it as a loophole to push through plans against the wishes of councils. This has happened in Malmesbury for example.

There are many other aspects to the situation – defining housing density, defining traffic flows, the effect of being in an AONB. All of these are far from established or clear, and even planning departments are giving incorrect advice.

So please be patient – by the time you read this the situation may be resolved. But rest assured, the two Parish Councils and many volunteers from the community are working hard to make sure we get

the best outcome possible. Finally, we should be clear that the parish councils only have an advisory capacity: our view of the planning application is taken into account (backed up by the Neighbourhood Plan) but the final decision is taken by Wiltshire Council. If the developers do put in a planning application the ONLY way to have a personal say is by going to the planning website.

WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Over the last few weeks, many of you will have noticed the change to LED lighting for our street lamps. This is part of Wiltshire Council's programme to reduce energy consumption from street lighting. The LED lights also demonstrate a significant reduction in UV content and less heat generated as waste energy, in this way the threat to insect life and bats is also reduced.

I attended the Full Council meeting a few weeks ago which included the Council's latest six-monthly update on its response to the climate emergency. The detailed report includes the significant investment in zero carbon homes for its council house new build programme and the second year of the Amenity Wildflower meadow trial with reduced cutting at 12 sites across the county to better support biodiversity.

Locally, I have been continuing to handle case work and consider planning applications, attended a site visit at Tisbury Pool by contractors to assess the pool surround and was happy to join the Tisbury Rubbish Collectors again to help keep the village free of litter. As we all know the condition of the surface of some of our roads continues to be an issue and I have, and will continue to report potholes and continue the dialogue with Wiltshire's Highways team to work to a long-term solution.

I have also launched monthly Councillor Surgeries, although there is not one in September, the next being 16 October. Do come along 10-11 am in the Reading Room on Tisbury High Street, you can make an appointment by email or just turn up. Get in contact if there is something you want to discuss.

CLICK OR CALL: YOU HAVE THE POWER TO SAVE POLICE TIME

With most COVID restrictions lifted, many people are starting to enjoy more freedoms than we have been afforded since the start of the pandemic in March 2020. For the Police force, this means they are likely to see a spike in demand and increases in calls for their service.

But – do you click, or do you call?

Every year, Police receive almost 100,000 999 calls and more than 50% of these are 'not urgent" meaning 999 was not the right method of contact. There is also the non-emergency 101 number, but Police receive almost 300,000 calls on this number each year, in addition to the 999 calls.

Remember: for urgent crime, call 999. For everything else, start online – and save police time.

FARM WATCH AND HORSE WATCH

Detective Sergeant Greg Fergusson of the Rural Crime Team says: "Rural crime has fallen during the lockdown periods over the past year. However, what we have seen is a shift of theft of larger equipment such as livestock, tractors and loaders to smaller items such as GPS systems and quad bikes that can more easily be transported. Livestock theft is still a problem but it has been harder to move animals around the country as there have been fewer vehicles on the road."



"We need everybody to be alert to rural theft particularly now Covid rules have been relaxed. You can report on the Wiltshire Police website or by calling 101. In an emergency situation always call 999."

Rural crime is not limited to theft but includes heritage crime and wildlife crime such as animal cruelty, poaching and hare coursing.

As we enter the harvest season, Wiltshire Police expect to see an increase in hare coursing and are asking members of the public who see activity they believe to be hare coursing - groups of men with running dogs in large open fields for example - to report the matter as soon as possible.
